Volunteer Spotlight: Lisa Mathiasen

In the spirit of thankfulness, we want to take a moment to talk about someone who has gone above and beyond to give their time, love, and dedication to our organization. ASAP Cats has had many heroes over the years, but none have stood as a pillar throughout all the highs and lows quite like Lisa Mathiasen.

Back in the summer of 1991, Lisa worked for the local Sheriff's Department. She regularly dispatched animal control officers after hours, so she had a passing familiarity with the county shelter team and was often on the phone with them. After hearing about a nearby cat colony being trapped and brought in, she brought a polaroid of a feral cat she was feeding (a small brown tabby she named Tiger) to the ASAP shelter. Lisa wanted to make sure he would not be euthanized after being trapped, and was lucky enough to be assisted by Karen Clayton, one of ASAP's founders, who greeted her with a simple "Hi! Looking to adopt a cat?" This turned out to be a life-changing moment for Lisa.

After getting to know ASAP a bit more and working with animal control officers and volunteers, she signed up to volunteer at the shelter in September of 1991 and officially joined the team. Working 10-hour days at the Sheriff's Department, she still managed to allot time to volunteer at the shelter, ensuring her everchanging schedule would allow for kitten time.

When ASAP introduced its Foster program in the early 90s, Lisa – who had become a Lead Volunteer by that time – additionally began fostering kittens. She gradually climbed the ranks as her involvement increased, eventually becoming Foster Coordinator and even joining the volunteer-led Board of Directors. In the early 2000s, she became Program Director for Shelter Operations, getting her involved in many of ASAP's projects and programs. From here she fleshed out the Lost Cat procedures and emergency protocol, tightening up several loose ends for the shelter. Lisa became a source of knowledge, guidance, and trust, having a handle on nearly all the inner workings of ASAP's maintenance.

In 2005 she was promoted to a managerial position at the Sheriff's Department, so her schedule became more rigid, and she was forced to give up being a shift leader. But that didn't stop Lisa from staying involved and helping at all the events, especially Basil's Big Bash. When the Bash turned into an annual fundraiser, Lisa became

the go-to person for gathering supplies, scouting locations, and even transporting everything to the venue in a U-Haul. She and her father built the Bash shed beside the shelter (referred to as "Lisa's shed" by our team) to store all the supplies she's gathered through the years.

Today, one of the main things Lisa is known for is being queen of the monthly yard sales, which started from an idea she had as Foster Coordinator: Kitten Showers. "I would bring a playpen and a pop-up tent with kittens, and people would bring blankets, toys, old heating pads – just things to donate," she says. Lisa's Kitten Showers were a hit for the community,

and over time people would bring more and more things to donate, to the point where she'd have tables set up at her Kitten Showers with unique antiques and trinkets for sale.

When the world shut down due to the COVID pandemic of 2020, plenty of Lisa's friends, colleagues, and community members started cleaning out their cupboards and donating stuff to her cause, wanting to help her raise funds for the shelter. She retired in 2021 from the sheriff's department and started working parttime with Santa Barbara SOS, where she found many people looking to downsize, who could donate their belongings to the yard sale. With every person who downsized and donated, the yard sale acquired more and more unique items to sell, in turn raising money for ASAP Cats. "I've done so many things," she says, "but what brings me the most joy is knowing I'm making some good money for ASAP and the kitties."

Having worn just about every hat possible during her tenure at ASAP Cats, Lisa obviously has a passion for the work she does and the kittens she saves. "My heart and soul is ASAP," Lisa says, "and knowing I'm a small part of this organization, making money for the kitties and helping the shelter be all that it is...that's my favorite part." We're thankful for you, Lisa!

Finding Tiny Teena by Macaulay

Teena found her way back home after journeying across state lines in search of her family. We spoke with her owner, Macaulay, to get the full story:

While looking for a cat for my daughter and myself, I met with Teena's previous caretaker to see if we'd be a good fit — and it was perfect, so Teena came to live with us in the beginning of 2022. Later that year, after going through a lot of life changes, my family and I decided to head west of Indiana for the winter to figure out our next steps. We debated what was best for Teena and decided to bring her along, so the cross-country adventure began!

Teena would spend her days in the car, tent, hotel – wherever she could beat the heat – and then she'd wander and explore at night while we camped. She did an amazing job staying close and coming back to the car every morning, and we were so happy to have our third wheel with us during our trip.

We were making our way back to Indiana from Arizona in February 2022 when Teena disappeared. She stuck to sleeping under my car seat whenever we drove, and after stopping at a gas station in Eloy, Arizona, she managed to somehow escape the vehicle. I looked for her in all the ways I could think of, knowing the traffic surely scared her enough to retreat from the parking lot, so we stayed the night close by to hopefully find her. I was on a deadline to make it back to Indiana for school, so after waiting 24 hours, my daughter and I had to continue onward. We were heartbroken and cried the rest of the trip.

Five months later, someone found Teena prowling around near a Taco Bell in Goleta, California. They brought her to ASAP where they scanned her microchip and quickly got in contact with us. My community immediately started brainstorming how to make the trip possible to retrieve Teena, because 2,000 miles from Indiana to Santa Barbara was a lot for one person, so eventually me, my uncle, and my mother got together and made the cross-country trip. We are so happy to have Teena

back, and I'm especially thankful to my family for accompanying me on the journey to get her back.

Now back home with us, Teena is getting used to a house that is totally new to her. We have pigs, chickens, and a dog, but she's sticking around, so I take that as a sign of her acceptance of her new pals! She's also been cuddlier than ever! Originally she was unwilling to be held, but now that she's back with us she's always asking to be picked up and cuddled, so we happily oblige.

Patcha: Back Home by Benjamin

After seven months of being declared missing, Patcha the Fearless was reunited with his owner, Benjamin, in a truly heartfelt moment at the ASAP Cats shelter. We sat down with Ben to get the full scoop:

Patcha was given to us originally as Waze after we reached out to ASAP in need of a mouser. We lived on a beautiful ranch behind Mission Canyon, with the caveat that the property was crawling with rats and mice, so naturally we wanted a cat to help. After doing a dog test with our cattle dog, we were initially going to have two unsocialized female cats stay with us, but instead we were introduced to one super feral "project case" male cat who would make for a great mouser, and we named him Patcha.

It took him about two weeks to feel comfortable out of his cage and in his woodshed, but I'd go sit with him every day, taking a sweaty t-shirt of mine that my dog slept with so he'd get to know everyone's scent. He always had quite a personality – strongly-typed bold Helvetica – but he and I always got along. He'd go out at night and hunt, bringing fresh kills through the kitty door with a loud announcement. He was a killer! Everyone in the canyon knew him. He kept an eye on everything and everyone. There were times he'd accompany me on hunts, and he even walked a lynx off the property once!

A few years later, we moved to a different ranch with a 2-year-old cat already living on it, who Patcha essentially kicked out. They found the cat, but the landlord and I had to come to an agreement because Patcha was aggressive to this cat. My parents up near Santa Ynez absolutely loved Patcha – my Dad especially – so we tried having Patcha stay with them for a time. It went from "This isn't a permanent thing" to "We want him forever" within the span of a week, and because I make weekly trips to see my parents, it made sense for Patcha to stay with them. It was a win-win.

While staying with my parents, my Mom asked me one day if he could join her for a car ride to church. Seeing as it was never a problem for me, I OK'd it and Patcha accompanied her. After the service, however,

when she got back to her car, Patcha immediately bolted. Just, gone. We put up signs and put out alerts, stayed in the area with cans of food and treats, but he was nowhere. That was April 2023.

The night Patcha was found, I was sitting outside by the fire thinking about him. I barbecue a lot, and as per tradition I always give the first piece of tri-tip to a guest, cutting off a little slice for Patcha. I was just thinking of all these nuanced things that made me really miss Patcha, and the next morning, I got a call from ASAP. A Good Samaritan had brought him and scanned his microchip, and they very quickly got in contact with me. Over the course of seven months, Patcha had journeyed over 30 miles from Ballard to Goleta. I don't know if he was hunting, if he just wanted to see the coast or venture through the mountains, but he found his way back home to his family.

I still have all of the furniture from our old place, and that first night he was back with us he rubbed on every corner of every piece of furniture. He went up to our blind dog – his best friend – and sniffed her, remembering her. Patcha is back, and my heart is so full.

Building a Legacy Together

We'd like to take a moment to highlight two of our incredibly generous donors who believe in ASAP's mission, inspiring us to keep doing good work and to always put cats first: Roger and Julie Davis.

The Davises have been acquainted with ASAP for over 20 years, starting back in the early 2000s when

they were completing construction on their vacation home in Santa Barbara. Previously living full-time in Chicago with their own shelter kitty, the Davises started vacationing here in the American Riviera and one day discovered our organization through their network. It certainly helps that they have always had a special affinity for cats. "Do we

believe every family should have a cat? We probably do!" Roger says. "To at least one family member, it likely will make a positive impact on their life."

As strong advocates for cat welfare, the Davises saw the bubbling potential in ASAP Cats as well as the concentrated focus placed on saving cats. They quickly developed a relationship with the organization. "ASAP is a premier catonly shelter," Roger says. "Beginning with the commitment of ASAP volunteers, the entire ASAP organization is very inspirational."

Attendees as well as top sponsors of every Bash we've held, the Davises love interacting with all the volunteers who keep ASAP running, and revel in being part of a community of cat lovers. "We have yet to meet a volunteer or employee who isn't absolutely passionate about their mission, and that's a big deal," says Julie. Roger still has his Top Cat table marker from our first Bash in 2014, and it's displayed prominently at his desk for all his guests to see. If someone in his network is unfamiliar with ASAP, he's always the first to spread the good word!

Roger and Julie put their trust in our

organization after noticing the impact we've had on our community since 1989. "ASAP has done a tremendous amount with a very limited size facility, and, at times, without a huge amount of money," Julie says. From taking euthanasia and 2-week-max stays off the table, to developing the Working Cats

program and alternateplacement programs to find a perfect fit for every cat, ASAP has continued to evolve to better serve the cats and people in Santa Barbara County.

Even before we announced Basil's Legacy Society, the Davises had already established a planned gift with ASAP, and this trust is not something we at ASAP hold lightly. In 2016, the

Davises added a bequest to ASAP in their estate plan, ensuring that the shelter would be able to use all necessary funds to continue saving lives. "Because of our confidence in the leadership of ASAP, we do not want the money to get locked up with a low spending limit of only four or five percent annually," says Roger. "Instead, our bequest allows ASAP leadership to use a significant portion of our gift whenever there is a major initiative to advance ASAP. We want it spent for the needs of ASAP. We wanted our money to go where it's best treated, and the longer an organization has been successful at achieving its mission, when its mission really resonates with the giver, is what motivates people — and what surely motivates us."

Thank you to Roger and Julie for trusting all of us at ASAP Cats to continue doing good work. Your support has made a significant difference for our organization, and thanks to your generosity we will continue changing the world for one cat at a time.

Retention Program Success: Kate Middleton





Identifying Ringworm In Cats

Did you know that ringworm is not caused by a worm? Originating from a type of fungi called dermatophytes, these fungi feed on dead cells of skin and hair, causing those round, red lesions to appear on humans. The ring tends to look like a worm – hence the name – but it's not as easy to identify on animals. Ringworm typically appears as a dry, grey, scaly patch on animals, but it can look like most skin lesions, so it's important to get your cat checked at the earliest sign.

One of our all-star fosters, Jo Black, noticed this scaly patch on her three foster kittens, and after talking to our Wellness team it was deemed that her kitties had ringworm. Being the hero she is, Jo immediately took on the challenge of treating her foster kitties (with guidance from our team). We equipped Jo with a Tyvek chemical suit, a solution of Betadine, and plenty of sponges, and she immediately got to work. "I just hold the kitties on my lap, then cover their paws, tails, and everything with the solution," she says, "and they're getting better!"

The hardest part for Jo was seeing her kitties losing their fur. Needle, the non-tuxedo of the three, lost her iconic white spike on her nose and has several bald spots that have yet to grow in. "This is my first time dealing with ringworm kitties," Jo says, "but they're still just as happy and bouncy as usual."

The most common test to check for ringworm comes from a tool called a Wood's lamp. Designed to emit light in a specific range of wavelengths, most ringworm fungi demonstrate a chemical reaction when binding to hair shafts, causing a bright apple-green fluorescence under black light. Treated with biweekly medicated dips and daily oral medication, kittens usually clear ringworm in as little as six weeks, but can take up to four months.

Be cautious: ringworm can spread from animal to human and vice-versa, so if you think your cat has ringworm, be sure to bring them to your vet immediately!

RVT Becky's Holiday Kitty Dinner Guide

While we all sit around the dinner table during the holidays, thinking about what we're grateful for, it's not an uncommon desire to want to spoil your kitty with some yummy food, but before you serve a

Thanksgiving platter to your cat, make sure you know what kinds of holiday foods they can enjoy.

A small amount of plain turkey, without fat, skin, or bones, can be a very welcome treat for your furry friend. However, large amounts of turkey, especially ones that are cooked with a lot of salt, seasoning, or butter, can cause your kitty to have an upset tummy. Ham is also not recommended, due to the large amount of salt needed in the curing process.

Many adult cats are intolerant of dairy foods, so while mashed potatoes alone may not be harmful to a cat that is interested in eating them, the large quantities of milk, cream, or butter that we add to them are not good for a cat. Sweet potatoes, candied yams, and pumpkin pie also often contain added dairy as well as large quantities of sugar, so we recommend not giving them to your cat.



Stuffing and other casseroles typically have added onion or garlic, members of the allium family. Vegetables within the allium family are extremely toxic to cats, as they can cause damage to their red blood cells. Other consequences of allium poisoning include weakness, depression, vomiting, diarrhea, and nausea. Some casseroles also have added raisins, which can be toxic to pets.

Our cats are family, so it's no surprise that we would want to include them in our holiday meals; however, cats have sensitive digestive systems that cannot tolerate a lot of human food ingredients. If you want to share the holiday cheer with your cat, skip the table scraps and get them some healthy, holiday-themed cat treats!

Beat the Heat: ASAP's First Spay/Neuter Clinic

For the first time in ASAP Cats' history, we held two highly successful spay/neuter clinics at the ASAP shelter. Partnering with Santa Barbara County Animal Services (SBCAS) and C.A.R.E.4Paws, we provided an affordable, lifesaving opportunity to better serve our community and all the cats living in it. We're super proud of it!

With increasing numbers of stray intakes and an overpopulation of cats in Santa Barbara neighborhoods, providing affordable options for cat care is paramount to our mission. Our low-cost clinic served to give necessary medical attention to local cats, including spay/neuter, microchipping, rabies treatment, FVRCP, flea treatment, and deworming.

Between the two events held in September and November, we treated 93 publicly-owned cats and spay-neutered 80 of them. Thank you to our volunteers and staff for helping us run these clinics, and we're looking forward to doing more great things for our community!
