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Eyes of Oracle: Testing Cats for Glaucoma

Named for the soothsayers of Greek antiquity, 7-year-old Oracle will immediately catch your attention with her beautiful, cloudy eyes. Reminiscent of two crystal balls, Oracle was brought to the shelter one night after a good Samaritan found her in their backyard yowling to the moon. Following a routine wellness exam and some blood work, Oracle was found to be in good health, and other than the fact that her eyes were cloudy and slightly protruding, there wasn't an immediate diagnosis for her condition. She wasn't in pain, and even seemed to have partial vision despite appearing blind.

In order to get a better read on Oracle's eye health, the logical next step was to employ the use of a Tono-pen, allowing our Wellness team to measure her intraocular fluid pressure. If you have ever had your eye pressure checked by an optometrist, it's likely you've had experience with a Tono-pen.

While the instrument is particularly helpful in gauging the risk of glaucoma in our cats with eye issues, it unfortunately is also rather expensive, so our team had to borrow one from our neighbors at County Animal Services. After running some tests, we confirmed that Oracle's eye pressure appears normal. While we continue to diagnose...

...and try to find an explanation behind her eyes, we can at least rule out glaucoma!

Needing a passionate foster to help administer medical eye drops and monitor this special kitty, Oracle found a friend in Amy Bristol, who welcomed her into her home in late May, where she has made "wonderful progress every day despite her limited vision and hearing," according to Amy.

Amy wrote to us with a recent update on Oracle, as she is now in the process of adopting her! She says:

The first couple of weeks, Oracle kept quiet under the darkness of my bed, but she now searches me out, zooms around the house, carries toys from bed to bed, and snuggles up at night. She's a real love bug and has added so much to my life. We are enjoying getting to know each other! I'm so glad to have little Oracle in my life and appreciate all the support ASAP offers.

All of us at ASAP are proud to help cats like Oracle, because ASAP Cats is so much more than just a shelter for stray kitties. We are a team of dedicated volunteers, animal welfare professionals, and all-around feline lovers, ready to serve any cat who passes through our doors. Despite high costs for cutting-edge equipment and often expensive surgeries, we never shy away

ASAP CATS WELLNESS WISH LIST: TONO-PEN (\$5,000)

Tonometry measures your intraocular pressure, or the pressure of the fluid in your eyes. Often referred to as IOP, intraocular pressure is an important metric to monitor eye health and to protect against sight-threatening diseases such as glaucoma. To measure IOP in cats, just as you would in humans, you would use a Tono-pen. Monitoring IOP is important for your cat's health, especially when it comes to predisposed breeds such as Burmese or Siamese, or senior cats with increased health risks, and having a Tono-pen accessible for the ASAP Wellness team would make a huge difference in protecting these cats' lives.

Managing Entropion in Kittens

Susan Zink, one of our star neonate kitten fosters, brought little Boo home earlier this summer. A tiny, smoky black cat with a lot of energy, it took mere moments for Susan's daughter Megan to fall in love with the foster kitten. Excited to hopefully adopt the small cat, Megan took Boo to her home in the Bay Area as a foster — but it wasn't long before she noticed Boo had an issue with her eye. After conferring with our Wellness team, Boo was found to have entropion, a condition resulting in an inward rolling of her eyelid.

Entropion may improve as kittens grow up, but it can also cause discomfort for the cat, as their lid hairs may rub against the cornea while rolled inward. It can additionally lead to dry eyes and eye infections such as conjunctivitis. Boo didn't appear to be uncomfortable, so Megan was advised to monitor her health for the time being.

After consulting with ASAP, Megan kept Boo with her in the Bay Area as a foster-to-adopt kitten, keeping an eye on her while giving her time to grow. She was still little, so there was a possibility that her eyelid would fix itself.

Boo was brought back to ASAP for a reassessment after she turned six months old, and as her eye continued to show signs of entropion, Dr. Lisa Okuda performed a surgical repair. She was able to go home the very same day with Megan, her adoption finalized. Now named Osita,

she's living happily in her forever home.

Megan recently wrote to our Wellness Director Becky Clement with an update on little Osita:

I wanted to reach out and say thank you so much for all of your help with Osita. I sincerely appreciate all of the support and care ASAP put into checking on her, performing the surgery, and providing me with the eye drops for the post-op care. She is doing really well and her eyes look very healthy. I'm taking her to my vet today to hopefully get the stitches out. Thank you again for all of your help with this! I am so glad I got to adopt Osita and have her be a part of my family.

To ensure little Osita's other eye remains healthy, our Wellness team is staying in touch with Megan. ASAP's relationship with our cats doesn't stop after adoption — we're here to help!

Treating Diabetic Cats at ASAP

Earlier this year, ASAP received an owner surrender cat with severe dental disease and a matted coat. A spunky 12-year-old senior named Pepe, he went through our normal checkin procedure to gauge his health, receiving routine blood work, a dental prophylaxis, and a lion clip to deal with his matted coat. Although slightly startled to sport a new look, Pepe was feeling much better than when he initially arrived and was adapting well to the shelter.

When Pepe was initially surrendered to ASAP Cats, we also were informed that he has diabetes — often regarded as a death sentence for cats due to a high requirement for care. Shelters across the country are known to euthanize diabetic cats, as most lack the resources or staff to accommodate these needy felines, but not ASAP Cats! Part of our mission is serving every cat we meet, so when Pepe entered our doors we knew we had to help him — and that we had the necessary tools to do so.

In a nutshell, diabetic cats require insulin injections, diagnostic testing, and regularly monitoring glucose curves. ASAP was able to place Pepe with a medical foster, and thanks to his amazing foster family he receives his twice-daily insulin injections from the comfort of a warm home.

With a resolve to never give up on cats, we're proud to help Pepe and any future

diabetic cats who enter our shelter, proving that diabetes in cats doesn't have to be the death sentence it was thought to be.

MONITORING GLUCOSE

When it comes to diabetes, humans and animals alike are required to have their glucose levels monitored, often achieved by collecting a small blood sample. Finger pricks and ear pokes are two common, relatively painless techniques for collecting blood, but they tend to cause some discomfort — so ASAP recently introduced an alternative for our diabetic kitties: an implanted monitoring device that offers flash glucose readings without the need for repeated pokes.

After noticing 8-year-old Jimmy drinking a lot more water than normal, Dr. Ginger White acted fast to test him for diabetes — and sure enough, her hunch was confirmed. Giving Jimmy the implanted monitoring device, our Wellness team has been able to regularly view his levels without the added stress of poking him — and because Dr. White intervened early enough, we're thrilled to report that Jimmy is currently in remission! We hope to continue using these monitoring implants for future eligible diabetic cats in our care.

Getting Goob Home: From Foster to Adoption

Barely a year old, Goob was transferred to ASAP Cats earlier this year with a hind leg fracture, suspected to be the result of being hit by a car. Our Wellness team was thankfully able to treat him, and following his orthopedic surgery the brave kitty was put on cage rest for two months. While he healed, Goob received plenty of attention and affection from our wonderful volunteers, so at least his mandated rest was quite comfortable!

Around this time, our shelter suffered a lot of damage from the terrible rainstorms that swept through Santa Barbara County. In order to best serve the kitties in our then-crumbling shelter, we put out a call for aid from our network of fosters to temporarily relocate all of our cats. Little Goob was one of them. Jon Berger, one of our amazing fosters, opened his heart to Goob and brought him home to escape the rain.

According to Jon, the timing of meeting Goob was perfect; "I was going through a breakup

at the time, so that gave me a great motivation to



start volunteering here at ASAP, and I was looking for some company at home when I met him." Jon brought Goob back for a final radiograph check after a month of fostering, and with a confirmation from Dr. Ginger White and Goob's orthopedic surgeon that he was fully healed, Jon finalized Goob's adoption papers and brought him to his forever home.

Now named Hobbes, Jon is happy to officially have his kitty companion as a fully-fledged family member. "He follows me around the house all the time," Jon says. "He's my first cat – the first cat that is truly mine – and we're attached at the hip."

Now that Hobbes is free from his exercise restriction following his surgery, he likes to bounce and play just as much as any other rambunctious 1-year-old orange kitty – so long as he's with his pal! Even when it's time to go to bed, Jon mentioned that Hobbes is never out of arm's reach: "Six inches away is too far from him!" Jon says.

Feisty Felines: The Pepper Kittens

It is always a huge triumph whenever our Tiny Lions graduate from the program and are adopted into loving homes. As our Tiny Lion tamers will tell you, these special kitties require patience, trust, and compassion to come out of their shells, and it often takes time to socialize them fully. Our tamers were put to the test when they met a rambunctious litter of five spicy kitties: the Pepper Kittens, aptly named Poblano, Serrano, Cayenne, Bell Pepper, and Pepperoncini.

Named after peppers of varying heat, these five cats were extra spicy all throughout their Tiny Lion taming and training. With weeks of patience, our Tiny Lion tamers were able to fully socialize each of the five pepper kitties, and they all made their ways into loving homes. Below is a short letter of love from the new family of Poblano, now named Whiskers:

Getting a kitten was the best decision we as a family made. We renamed Poblano to Whiskers, and he has been an absolute joy to have. He was skittish at first in a new environment with a crazy owner who wants to hold him ALL the time, but over time he has gotten used to all three of us. He has his routine down already! He loves to cuddle on you when you're watching tv which was a huge thing my daughter wanted. He's absolutely crazy, energetic, and wonderful. Sometimes we swear he thinks he has superpowers!
